Decision Items¹:

- ***Decision:*** In January, PRCC Habitat Subcommittee members approved a budget amendment for the Bartsch Acquisition – Lower Twisp River – Reach 2A Project. The total cost of the project (including the budget amendment) is \$1,250,200. Funding for this project will come from Fund 602.
- ***Decision:*** PRCC Habitat Subcommittee members approved \$310,457 for the Completed Sediment Analysis and Feasibility Study at Enloe Dam Project. Funding for this project will come from Fund 602.
- ***Decision:*** PRCC Habitat Subcommittee members agreed to add American West Ag Appraisals and Agri/Com Appraisals to their list of approved appraisers.

I. Welcome and Introductions

Tracy Hillman welcomed everyone to the meeting and participants introduced themselves.

II. Agenda Review

The PRCC Habitat Subcommittee (PRCC HabSC or HabSC) reviewed and approved the February agenda with the addition of the Enloe Dam Feasibility specification sheet.

III. December Meeting Notes

PRCC HabSC members reviewed and approved the 12 December 2024 meeting notes.

IV. Review Action Items

The PRCC HabSC reviewed the following action items from the December meeting:

- Tracy Hillman will inform the Methow Salmon Recovery Foundation that the PRCC HabSC does not support selling Lot #2 of the Robertson property but recommends that the sponsor submit a specification sheet requesting funds to support public access, outreach and engagement, and property maintenance and stewardship on each of the Sugar Reach properties acquired with assistance from the PRCC HabSC. **Completed.**
- Dave Duvall will reach out to potential appraisers to see whether they are interested in working on appraisals for the PRCC HabSC. He will also see whether representatives from the appraisal companies are available to meet with the PRCC HabSC during the January meeting. **Completed. The appraisers will join the meeting today.**

V. Project Updates

Members of the PRCC HabSC provided the following updates on funded projects:

- **Appraisals** – Dave Duvall reported that the review appraisal contract will be expiring but there are still funds available for primary appraisals already on contract.

- **ORRI VDS Backwatering Project** – Chris Fisher reported that the Okanagan Nation Alliance (ONA) is currently implementing this project and may have completed it. He will provide additional information during the March meeting.
- **Lower Wenatchee Instream Flow Enhancement Project, Phase II Project** – Kate Terrell reported that the sponsor (Trout Unlimited; TU) and their contractor, Smith Excavation, continue working through a potential contract change order that will extend the existing construction contract between TU and Smith Excavation to allow for construction in fall 2025 through spring 2026. To keep the project team in the loop with the change order process, the sponsor called a special team meeting, which included the engineer of record (Aaron Anderson – Pacific Engineering). During the meeting, Aaron reviewed the change order process to bring Jones Shotwell Ditch Company (JSDC) Directors and the project team up to speed and reviewed the initial cost increase analysis results completed to date. Aaron believes that Smith’s requested cost increase is justified and reasonable, but the actual determination will be made once the analysis is complete. Greg Smith offered to meet with the JSDC Directors and project team to discuss and address questions regarding the change order and associated cost increase. There remain some challenges and uncertainties associated with accepting the change order or rebidding the project.
- **Cascade Orchards Icicle Creek (COIC) Flow Restoration Project** – Justin Yeager reported that most of the pipe in the canal is covered and all laterals are installed and covered except for those along East Leavenworth Road. A few service connections have been installed with the rest of the work planned for this spring. The sponsor (Chelan County Natural Resources Department; CCNRD) is working with COIC to get an operations and maintenance plan in place and is assisting COIC with hiring a manager before irrigation service starts. The work is scheduled to be completed by 1 May 2025.
- **Okanagan Lake Dam East Salmon Passage Project** – Dave Duvall said that ONA completed the design for the fishway, and he is waiting for the final invoice on the design work.
- **Peshastin Creek RM 2.5 Project** – Kate Terrell indicated that Cascade Fisheries (CF) continues to coordinate with the landowner and Chelan Douglas Land Trust on a conservation easement to protect the restored habitat. In addition, they continue to coordinate with the Corps of Engineers and Department of Ecology to work through Clean Water Act permitting. This included developing a water quality protection and monitoring plan and a habitat function monitoring plan. They responded to the Army Corps of Engineers request for information on the cultural resource survey. They heard back from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) regarding the Conditional Letter of Map Revision (CLOMR) application. FEMA had several comments and questions for the sponsor, which is common with first submittals. The design team is addressing the comments. The sponsor was notified by BPA that BPA wants to fund the project for \$450,000; although, availability of new federal money remains uncertain.
- **Bockoven Entiat and Stormy Acquisition Projects** – Kate Terrell reported that the landowner is on pause while they seek a buyer for their home (the Stormy Lodge on 17 acres on river right). The landowner is concerned that a potential buyer may want to purchase either or both properties for hiking and horseback riding. The landowner does not feel an urgency to sell the properties at this time.
- **Canyon Creek Culvert Design and Construction Project** – Kate Terrell indicated that Cascade Fisheries is waiting for comments from the Forest Service on the 30% design.

- **Eagle Rocks Habitat Enhancement Project** – Kate Terrell said the sponsor (Methow Salmon Recovery Foundation; MSRF) did not do any work over the winter. Work to be completed in spring 2025 includes monitoring and maintenance of plantings, additional repair to the access routes, and incorporating beaver-dam-analog-style posts into the upper bench planting areas.
- **Kedrowski Acquisition Project** – Kate Terrell indicated that the sponsor (MSRF) is waiting for the start of the appraisal. Kate noted that the contract between Grant PUD and MSRF has been signed, and the team is working through the remaining paperwork. Dave Duvall added that based on a conversation with the sponsor, the landowner would like the appraisal conducted in two parts: (1) appraise what is proposed and (2) appraise everything. The sponsor indicated to Dave that this could be a good opportunity to gain added protections beyond what the landowner first supported. The sponsor does not believe the added review will increase the appraisal cost significantly and believes that having the appraisal would increase opportunities to request additional acquisition funds through the upcoming Salmon Recovery Funding Board process.
- **Shuttleworth Creek Diversion Removal Project** – Dave Duvall shared that this project is complete and can be closed once Grant PUD receives the final invoice.
- **Bartsch Acquisition – Lower Twisp River – Reach 2A Project** – Kate Terrell said the sponsor (MSRF) requested additional funds from the PRCC HabSC to cover the higher-than-expected appraised value (see Section VI). The acquisition will support and expand options for planned restoration activities associated with the Twisp Ponds project. The sponsor and Bartsch negotiated and signed a Purchase and Sale Agreement. The sponsor has initiated the closing process through CW Title (formerly Baines).
- **Skyline Screen and Fish Return Project** – Kate Terrell said the sponsor (MSRF) coordinated with engineers, the contractor, and WDFW staff regarding the March work window. The sponsor confirmed that components are in hand for March construction.
- **Penticton Dam Fish Passage Construction** – Chris Fisher shared that the sponsor (ONA) will begin construction in March with the project completed in May or June. Dave Duvall noted that the Grant PUD Commission approved funding for the project.

VI. Restoration/Protection Projects

Bartsch Property Acquisition Budget Amendment

For the record, Tracy Hillman said the PRCC HabSC received a budget amendment request on 31 December 2024 from the Methow Salmon Recovery Foundation on the Bartsch Acquisition – Lower Twisp River - Reach 2A Project. The sponsor indicated that the cost of the property, based on the recent appraisal, was greater than the amount originally requested from the PRCC HabSC. That is, in June 2024, the PRCC HabSC approved \$919,200 for this acquisition, which included \$900,000 for the purchase of the property and \$19,200 for administration, management, taxes, title, boundary adjustment, and other expenses. The recently completed appraisal valued the property at \$1,230,000, which is \$330,000 greater than the amount approved by the PRCC HabSC. Therefore, the sponsor requested an additional \$330,000 to cover the difference in the value of the property plus an additional \$1,000 for taxes and fees. On 8 January 2025, the PRCC HabSC approved the budget amendment. The total contribution from the PRCC HabSC for this project increased from \$919,200 (original contribution) to \$1,250,200. The project received funding from Habitat Supplemental Fund 602. Because the total cost of the project was

over \$1M, the Grant PUD Commissioners needed to approve the expense. Dave Duvall stated that the Commissioners will be reviewing the project at the next scheduled commission meeting.

Decision: *In January, PRCC Habitat Subcommittee members approved a budget amendment for the Bartsch Acquisition – Lower Twisp River – Reach 2A Project. The total cost of the project (including the budget amendment) is \$1,250,200. Funding for this project will come from Fund 602.*

Floodplain Monitoring Proposal

Hans Smith introduced the Floodplain Restoration: Monitoring Fish Responses at Site, Reach, and Population Scales Proposal from Hinchinbrook, Inc. The purpose of the study is to conduct a third year of monitoring fish responses to floodplain restoration at multiple spatial scales at treatment and reference reaches within the Wenatchee, Methow, and Entiat sub-basins. The proposed work will focus on specific areas where key questions remain and begin pre-implementation studies at project sites where implementation is scheduled to occur in 2025. They requested funding to continue the work in the Wenatchee and Methow sub-basins with a cost-share provided for the Entiat. The first two years of the study were funded by the HCP Tributary Committees and the Salmon Recovery Funding Board (SRFB).

The specific goals of the project are to:

1. Explain why overall habitat quality and diversity on floodplains are only sometimes correlated with fish density at the reach scale.
2. Verify whether the response variables (growth, survivorship, and capacity) observed on perennial floodplains are similar to or different from those on seasonal floodplains.
3. More broadly contextualize results by conducting pre-implementation studies and showing how existing study sites inform restoration goals in terms of benefits to fish.
4. Synthesize results from the three-year study, including calculation of habitat- and life stage-specific capacity and productivity values to inform ongoing Life Cycle Modeling efforts (e.g., HARP model) in the Upper Columbia.

Before members discussed the proposed project, Carlos Polivka (U.S. Forest Service) and Keith van den Broek (Hinchinbrook) joined the meeting to answer questions. Carlos indicated that all previous comments received by the HCP Tributary Committees and SRFB were addressed in the specification sheet. Jeremy Cram said he had difficulty downloading the proposal. As a result, he was unable to thoroughly review the proposal. Carlos apologized for the difficulty with downloading the proposal and provided key highlights. He said new information indicates unexpected movements and extended residence time in certain habitats. Additionally, there are observations of movements of salmonids on the floodplain both upstream and downstream. This was most apparent during the second year of the study. Carlos said they plan to conduct further analyses to understand patterns and implications for habitat sustainability. He shared that they examined habitat scale vs. reach scale data and the differences between perennial and seasonal capacity. They have a new methodology in place to analyze floodplain populations.

Jeremy asked how survival rates could be so high when his observations indicate a significant amount of mortality. Carlos responded that the recapture rates were calculated on a week-to-week basis rather than over a longer time period. This may explain the observed discrepancies. He added that further review will be conducted to refine data interpretation and ensure consistency in reporting.

After Carlos and Keith left the meeting, members discussed in detail the pros and cons of the proposed monitoring study. Members present found value in some of the proposed goals but questioned the relevance of other goals. As a result, they generally supported goals 2 and part of 4. That is, they may support verifying whether the response variables (growth, survivorship, and capacity) observed on

perennial floodplains are similar to or different from those on seasonal floodplains and a report synthesizing the three-years of study. Of the five members present, three supported the two goals, one needed additional time to study the proposal, and another abstained. Because Justin Yeager was unable to participate in the discussion, members present directed Tracy Hillman to discuss this project with Justin and share members' thoughts with Justin.

Following the meeting, Tracy contacted Justin and shared the HabSC discussion and thoughts with Justin. Justin appreciated the thorough review by his colleagues and recommended that the sponsor submit a revised specification sheet that includes the two goals and a revised cost estimate. After the PRCC HabSC receives a revised specification sheet, they will then decide whether to support the monitoring project.

Enloe Dam Feasibility Proposal

Kate Terrell introduced the Completed 30% Design of Selected Action Alternative to Remove Enloe Dam Proposal from Trout Unlimited (TU). Kate indicated that all Bipartisan Infrastructure Law and Inflation Reduction Act funds have been frozen, including funds from NOAA and the USFWS associated with this project. Even though the funds were allocated in FY 2023 and FY 2024, the accounts have been frozen, and she is unsure how long this freeze will last. Therefore, to keep the process moving forward, TU is requesting \$767,277 to complete the following steps:

1. Analyze and present new sediment data with a sediment suitability memo to the technical advisory committee (TAC) and permitting agencies to finalize selection of a preferred alternative.
2. Incorporate feedback from TAC and permitting agencies into final feasibility study and present to TAC and public.
3. Complete 30% design package, planning cost estimate, and basis of design report for the selected alternative.

Kate noted that if the federal funds become available, all funding from the PRCC HabSC would be returned to the PRCC HabSC.

Chris Fisher added that all three alternatives include dam removal. He said the three alternatives focus on how to manage the sediments behind the dam. The funding request aims to advance the project to 30% design and identify the preferred alternative for sediment removal. Dave Duvall asked whether the HCP Tributary Committees have supported any of this work. Chris said, yes, the Tributary Committees contributed funding for the feasibility study. Dave asked whether fish will be able to pass the falls once the dam is removed. Chris said, yes; a study conducted by Inter-Fluve determined that there are six passage routes for steelhead and summer Chinook Salmon to pass the natural falls.

Dave reminded the Subcommittee that Grant PUD management is very sensitive to the perception that Grant PUD supports dam removal. Grant PUD is not in the business of approving funding for the removal of hydroelectric dams and believes the owner of the dam should be responsible for funding dam removal. Therefore, Dave said he can only support funding for steps 1 and 2 at this time. All members present supported funding for steps 1 and 2. Chris said he will send Dave information from Okanogan PUD indicating their approval and support of Enloe Dam removal. Dave can share this information with his managers. For contracting purposes, the sponsor will need to submit a revised specification sheet requesting funding for only steps 1 and 2.

The sponsor provided a revised specification sheet on 21 February 2025. The title of the project is: "Completed Sediment Analysis and Feasibility Study at Enloe Dam." The requested funding amount from the PRCC HabSC was \$310,457.

Decision: PRCC Habitat Subcommittee members approved \$310,457 for the Completed Sediment Analysis and Feasibility Study at Enloe Dam Project. Funding for this project will come from Fund 602.

VII. Administration and Information Updates

PRCC Habitat Account Deposits – Dave Duvall reported that Grant PUD will make deposits into the accounts on 15 February 2025. He also noted that he should receive 2024 fourth quarter financials from the Grant PUD Accounting Department within a week or two. He will share this information as soon as it is available.

Identify Alternate Appraisers and Reviewers

Dave Duvall indicated that he reached out to both American West Ag Appraisals and Agri/Com Appraisals to see if they could join the PRCC HabSC meeting us to discuss appraisal projects. Kristen Los, American West Ag Appraisals, joined the meeting at 1:30 pm. Dave described the structure and function of the PRCC HabSC and summarized the types of acquisitions the PRCC HabSC fund. He also shared with her the standard Deed of Right, restrictions, and the PRCC HabSC requirement that the appraiser will not communicate with the Project Sponsor or landowner in any manner, whether it be regarding the project or otherwise, without express permission from, or the presence of, the designated HabSC liaison. Kristen agreed with the requirements and noted that she has experience conducting floodplain appraisals (e.g., she has worked for Chelan Douglas Land Trust on these types of projects) in Grant, Chelan, and Okanogan counties. She indicated that she is not Yellow Book certified and does not want to review appraisals. She is only interested in conducting the appraisals. Kristen asked about turnaround times and Dave responded that once the appraisal is ordered, the PRCC HabSC would like the appraisal within a month or two.

Jim McCullough, Agri/Com Appraisals, joined the meeting at 2:00 pm. As with Kristen, Dave provided background on the PRCC HabSC and their requirements. Jim agreed with the requirements and indicated that it is unethical for an appraiser to speak with anyone except the client, which in this case is the PRCC HabSC. Jim emphasized that confidentiality is a high priority in his work. Like Kristen, he also has experience appraising floodplains in Grant, Chelan, and Okanogan counties. He said he is not Yellow Book certified and is not interested in reviewing appraisals. He is only interested in conducting the appraisals. Jim indicated that he could provide a list of appraisers who are Yellow Book certified and are willing to review appraisals.

After the discussion with the appraisers, members present agreed that both should be added to the list of approved appraisers. Thus, the PRCC HabSC approved appraisers include Pacific Appraisal Associates, American West Ag Appraisals, and Agri/Com Appraisals. Members were disappointed that American West Ag Appraisals and Agri/Com Appraisals were not Yellow Book certified and did not want to review appraisals. As a result, Dave will reach out to Jim for a list of potential Yellow Book certified appraisers and a list of people who are interested in reviewing appraisers. Dave will provide an update during the March meeting.

Decision: PRCC Habitat Subcommittee members agreed to add American West Ag Appraisals and Agri/Com Appraisals to their list of approved appraisers.

Review Operating Procedures

The PRCC HabSC reviewed their operating procedures and made no changes to the document.

Salmon Recovery Funding Board 2025 Schedule

Tracy Hillman reviewed the Salmon Recovery Funding Board/Tributary Committees proposed schedule for 2025 (see Attachment 1). Important dates are noted below:

1. Pre-Applications Due: 12 March 2025
2. Presentations by Project Sponsors: 25-26 March 2025
3. Completed Draft Applications Due: 18 April 2025
4. Site Visits: 5-8 May 2025
5. Tributary Committees Review Draft Applications: 8 May 2025
6. Final Application Due: 27 May 2025
7. Tributary Committees Review Final Applications: 12 June 2025

Education and Outreach Funding

Tracy Hillman indicated that he received a question from Jason Lundgren (Cascade Fisheries) asking whether the PRCC HabSC funds education and outreach projects. Jason indicated that they are currently working on a 4-acre salmon-themed park at the Leavenworth Nation Fish Hatchery. With a grant from the Washington Recreation and Conservation Office, they are working with a landscape architecture firm on developing a preliminary design (see Attachment 2). They estimate it will cost \$3-4 million to construct the project. Jason noted that there are few grants available to fund these types of projects and is wondering whether Habitat funds can help support education and outreach.

All members indicated that they support education and outreach; however, there are few funds within the PRCC HabSC to support these activities. In the past, the PRCC HabSC has supported science conferences and workshops as part of education and outreach. Members indicated that project sponsors can request funding for education and outreach, but they need to understand funds are limited and projects will be addressed on a case-by-case basis.

Habitat Project Effectiveness Monitoring

Dave Duvall indicated that he would like to discuss the state-of-the-science on habitat effectiveness monitoring. He shared that he has read a few papers on habitat effectiveness monitoring and is wondering whether the PRCC HabSC should be considering a review of the literature and determine whether PRCC HabSC monitoring funds can be used to fill information gaps. In the interest of time, Dave said he would like to discuss this during the March meeting.

Signage on Acquisition Properties

Dave Duvall stated that the PRCC HabSC has funded several protection projects. He questioned whether the protected properties should have signs indicating the good work the PRCC HabSC is doing in protecting high-quality habitat. He said he would like to discuss this during the March meeting.

Equipment List

In the interest of time, Dave Duvall said this item will be discussed during the March meeting.

Federal Funding Issues

Lastly, Tracy Hillman reported that he received an email from Jason Lundgren (Cascade Fisheries) indicating that with all the uncertainty associated with federal funding, the PRCC HabSC should expect

more requests from sponsors asking for funding to fill the void created by the loss of federal funding. This will include requests for funds to help sponsors continue their day-to-day operations.

VIII. Adjourn

Tracy Hillman adjourned the meeting at 4:45 pm.

IX. Next Meeting

The next meeting of the PRCC HabSC will be on 13 March 2025.
